



4. Approval of Minutes of May 16, 2012 Meeting

A copy of the minutes was provided in the board packet for review.

Following consideration, a motion was made by Mr. Johnston to approve the minutes for the May 16, 2012 meeting. The motion was seconded by Mr. Druzbick and carried unanimously.

5. Contract for Consulting Executive Director . . . Jack Sullivan, WRWSA

Mr. Sullivan presented the proposed contract between Richard S. Owen and the WRWSA for the position of executive director. The contract was negotiated based on the existing director's contract and establishes a July 1, 2012 effective date, compensation, and terms of separation.

Following consideration, a motion was made by Ms. McNiff to approve the new executive director's contract as stated. The motion was seconded by Mr. Johnston and carried unanimously.

6. Executive Director's Report ... Jack Sullivan, WRWSA

a. Bills to be Paid

Mr. Sullivan provided a handout to the Board detailing the bills for June 2012 and requested the Board approve payment of these bills in the amount of \$28,091.67.

Following consideration, a motion was made by Mr. Mask to approve payment of the June 2012 bills totaling \$28,091.67. The motion was seconded by Mr. Druzbick and carried unanimously.

b. 2nd Quarter Financial Report

Mr. Sullivan reviewed the 2nd Quarter Financial Report with the Board. Purvis, Gray and Company prepared the report for the three months and six months ended March 31, 2012. The current ratio of assets to liabilities is 21:1. Mr. Sullivan further advised the Board that the operating loss is coming out of the reserve funds as budgeted. He recommended approval of the financial report.

Following consideration, a motion was made by Mr. McLeod to approve the financial report. The motion was seconded by Ms. McNiff and carried unanimously.

c. Proposed Budget FY 2012-2013

Mr. Sullivan reviewed the proposed budget for fiscal year 2012-2013. He reviewed additions and deletions to the proposed budget compared to the prior fiscal year budget items. Significant changes to the upcoming budget include a reduction in the executive Director's compensation and reductions in the "overlap funds" included in the current budget, slightly offset by a small allowance for as-needed services from Mr. Sullivan,

requested by the incoming Executive Director, an increase in the administrative support, which is more than offset by Nancy Smith assuming responsibilities for administering Phase 2 of the Irrigation Audit program in lieu of retaining a separate contract administrator. Other changes include two matching grants through the SWFWMD Cooperative Funding Initiative program to update the Master Water Supply Plan and to continue the Residential Irrigation Audit program. The proposed budget also includes \$75,000 for seeking additional professional services as needed. The Authority will solicit various firms with abilities in engineering and planning, through a Request for Qualifications process. Chairman Damato requested clarification as to the dollar amount of contracts that can be let by the WRWSA without competitive bidding. Mr. Haag responded that state laws allows qualified firms to be contracted with as needed, as long as the contract is \$25,000 or less. Mr. Sullivan recommended approval of the proposed budget.

Following consideration, a motion was made by Mr. Druzbick to approve the budget for FY 2012-2013. The motion was seconded by Mr. Mask and carried unanimously.

d. Request Travel for Diane Salz, Environmental Permitting Course

Mr. Sullivan presented a travel request for Diane Salz, Governmental Affairs Consultant, to attend the Environmental Permitting Summer School. The event is scheduled for July 17-20, 2012 on Marco Island. The FY 2011-2012 budget has money for both travel and registration.

Following consideration, a motion was made by Mr. Johnston to approve travel costs for Ms. Salz to attend the Environmental Permitting Summer School. The motion was seconded by Mr. Druzbick and carried unanimously.

e. Correspondence

Mr. Sullivan reviewed the correspondence provided in the Board's meeting packet and in the handouts. This item was provided for information only. No action was required.

f. News Articles

This item was provided for information only. No action was required.

7. Legislative Update ... Diane Salz, Governmental Affairs Consultant

Ms. Salz reported on several water and water-related issues under discussion in various venues across the state. She also advised the Board on upcoming meetings of the SWFWMD Governing Board, the Florida Conservation Coalition, and the Central Florida Water Initiative.

This item was provided for information only. No action was required.

8. Attorney's Report ... Larry Haag, WRWSA Attorney

Mr. Haag had no business for the Board.

9. Other Business

There was no other business.

10. Public Comment

Al Grubman spoke to the Board concerning its adopted Phase II plan [Detailed Water Supply Feasibility Analyses] dated April 2010. He is concerned that it does not guarantee against

groundwater being transferred from county to county and he requested that the WRWSA officially amend this plan by the next board meeting.

Rose Rocco, Hernando County resident, addressed the Board with concerns about the types of materials being used to fill and stabilize sinkholes. Chairman Damato asked Richard Owen for some follow-up information on sinkhole remediation.

Pete Hubbell commented on the Phase II report. The Phase II report contains recommendations for short-, mid- and long-term water supply needs and resources. This does not commit the WRWSA or its member governments to any specific strategy. In addition, local governments that seek to inter-connect with other local governments in sharing water supplies do not come before the WRWSA for approval.

11. Next Meeting Time and Location

The next meeting is scheduled for July 18, 2012 at 4:30 p.m., at the Lecanto Government Building, Room 166, 3600 W. Sovereign Path, Lecanto, Florida 34461.

Mr. Sullivan reminded the Board that traditionally, the WRWSA has not held a regular board meeting in August. He asked the Board to consider whether to meet on August 15, 2012. It was the consensus of the Board to eliminate the August meeting from the schedule.

Chairman Damato announced there was no further business or discussion to come before the WRWSA and adjourned the meeting at 5:28 p.m.

5. Local Government Grants

5. Local Government Grant Applications

At the Authority's May 2012 meeting, the Board approved an allocation of \$130,000 for the Fiscal Year 2013 grants program. The Authority has received three grant applications, a summary of which is included in the attached Exhibit A. Copies of the applications are also included as exhibits to this item.

As shown in Exhibit A, the total amount requested slightly exceeds the amount allocated for funding. Each of the applications meets the grants program requirements and staff believes each of the applications will contribute to the conservation and protection of the region's water resources. Staff has therefore reduced the amount recommended for each grant by a prorated amount to bring the total to the \$130,000 allocated.

Staff Recommendation: Approval of the grants in the amounts shown in Exhibit A for Fiscal Year 2013.

BRIEF OVERVIEW:

Citrus County Water Resources has an established water conservation program geared toward increasing water-use efficiency, reducing demands on local water resources, reducing the per person per capita to 150 gallons per day, and adhering to minimum permit requirements established by Southwest Florida Water Management District for consumptive use permits. The Withlacoochee Regional Water Supply Authority's grant program assists local governments in meeting these requirements by providing assistance to water conservation programs such as Citrus County's. It is Citrus County Water Resources' goal to use this grant to leverage the existing conservation budget to carry out its water conservation program. WRWSA will reimburse expenses on a 50% basis, up to a maximum amount of \$50,000. County cash match is \$50,000.

A RESOLUTION BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF HERNANDO COUNTY, FLORIDA, SITTING AS THE GOVERNING BOARD OF THE HERNANDO COUNTY WATER AND SEWER DISTRICT, SUPPORTING THE HERNANDO COUNTY UTILITIES **DEPARTMENT'S** "LOCAL GOVERNMENT WATER **SUPPLY** TO ASSISTANCE PROGRAM" APPLICATION THE WITHLACOOCHEE REGIONAL WATER SUPPLY AUTHORITY FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF A COUNTYWIDE WATER CONSERVATION AND QUALITY PROTECTION PROGRAM; AUTHORIZING THE CHAIRMAN TO EXECUTE THE APPLICATION AND ANY RELATED DOCUMENTS THAT MAY BE REQUIRED; AUTHORIZING THE DIRECTOR OF THE UTILITIES DEPARTMENT TO DESIGNATE APPROPRIATE STAFF TO PERFORM THE TECHNICAL, FINANCIAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE ACTIVITIES ASSOCIATED HEREWITH; PROVIDING THAT THIS RESOLUTION SUPERSEDE PRIOR ACTIONS IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF HERNANDO COUNTY, FLORIDA, AS FOLLOWS:

WHEREAS, the Hernando County Water and Sewer District (the "District") was created by ordinance and established in all of the unincorporated area of the county; and

WHEREAS, the Hernando County Board of Commissioners (the "Board") is the Governing Board of the District; and,

WHEREAS, the Hernando County Utilities Department (the "HCUD") is responsible for the operation and maintenance of the water and wastewater facilities and infrastructure of the county; and,

WHEREAS, the Board recognized that in order to protect the water resources of unincorporated Hernando County and to properly plan for the future needs of its citizens, the establishment of a Water Conservation and Water Resource Protection Program for the County and the District is essential; and,

WHEREAS, the Southwest Florida Water Management District (the "SWFWMD") has identified water conservation as an essential planning and protection element of its water resource management program; and,

WHEREAS, the Withlacoochee Regional Water Supply Authority (the "Authority") was established, of which Hernando County is a member, to provide an entity to help ensure that an adequate and safe supply of water is available for the citizens of the region and the county; and,

- WHEREAS, the Authority has established the "Local Government Water Supply Funding Assistance Program" to which a member may apply for cooperative funding for water supply projects or projects relating to the development of water supply; and,
- WHEREAS, the Authority has determined that the establishment and development of water conservation programs support and further the intention of the water supply development of the region; and,
- WHEREAS, the HCUD has submitted an application to the Authority's funding assistance program to seek financial assistance in the development of a countywide water conservation program (the "Project") in order to provide water conservation education throughout the entire county.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF HERNANDO COUNTY, FLORIDA:

- **SECTION 1.** The above recitals are incorporated herein by reference and made a part hereof.
- **SECTION 2.** The Board of County Commissioners ("Board") hereby gives its official support for the Hernando County Utilities Department to submit an application to the Withlacoochee Regional Water Supply Authority for cooperative funding in the development of the County's water conservation program.
- **SECTION 3.** The Board, in order to meet the terms of the financial assistance program, agrees to budget and expend on the Project an amount equal to or greater than the required fifty percent (50%) matching funds as required by the program.
- **SECTION 4.** The Board understands and agrees that it shall expend its required matching funds prior to the Authority expending its fifty percent (50%) match for the Project.

Local Government Water Supply Funding Assistance Program

Program Guidelines:

Since 1999, the Board of Directors of the Authority has provided assistance to local governments for water supply projects. Funding for these projects has come from the Authority's Water Resource Capital Projects Fund. Revenues secured from the Charles A. Black Water Supply Facility owned by the Authority and operated and maintained by Citrus County have funded the program. Other funds from the Authority administration budget may be utilized as available.

The criteria for selecting a local water supply project for potential funding are as follows:

- 1. The project must be within the Withlacoochee Regional Water Supply Authority jurisdiction and must be for a member local government.
- 2. The project must relate to water conservation.
- 3. The project must be approved by the submitting local government's City Council or County Commission prior to submittal to the WRWSA. A resolution of support for the project and commitment of funding by the local government should accompany the application. The Authority, in its sole discretion, will evaluate and approve / disapprove each project based on its merits.
- 4. The Authority Board of Directors will establish the amount of money available each year for inclusion in the funding program. The maximum funding level has been established as \$100,000 per year. The number of approved applicants will determine the amount of funding for each project. However, the Authority established a general guideline in 2004 of funding up to 1/2 of a project budget up to an amount not to exceed \$50,000 per project.
- 5. The local government applicant must provide a scope of services for the project that describes the objective of the project, the tasks involved in the project, the cost per task and the time frame for completion of the project. Generally, the Authority requests that the local government expend it's pro rata portion of the project budget before the Authority begins paying its pro rata portion.
- 6. Local governments that have received approval for a grant from the Authority shall not be eligible for another project grant until the previous grant project has been completed:
 - a. Completion of a project shall mean that the total project or the phase of a project for which the grant was used must have been completed. Completion shall also mean that payment for services funded by the grant has been made by the local government and a request for final reimbursement of the two-thirds contribution by the Authority has been sent by the local government and received by the Authority. An exception to this procedure may occur when the local government has shown evidence that the money to be expended has been encumbered, but for scheduling purposes, has not yet been expended. However, the monies must be spent within a specified timeframe proposed by the local government and approved by the Authority. The Authority shall only reimburse the local government for monies actually expended. [Approved July 16, 2003]

- b. Projects for which Authority funding constituted only a part of the total project must have a formal resolution from the member local government that the balance of the project will be completed.
- c. In setting funding priorities during a grant funding cycle, projects for which Authority funding constituted only a part of the total project will defer priority first to projects for member governments that have never been funded and second to previously funded projects that have completed their total project.
- 7. If either the approved project tasks or the project time frames are changed, the project applicant must revise the scope of services as soon as they are known and receive approval of these revisions from the Authority at a regularly scheduled meeting. Approved changes will be incorporated into the local government contract.
- 8. The application process will open on May 1 of each year and close on the last working day in June. The applications will be considered by the Board during its July and August Board meetings as necessary. Awards will be made after the September Board meeting. Local Government contracts will be prepared by the Authority's Attorney and Executive Director and approved by the Authority Board and submitted to Local Governments for review and approval by January of the following year.

Application Process:

- 1. The grant application period opens on May 1 of each calendar year and closes on the last working day of June. The completed application and all attachments must be submitted by 5:00 p.m. on the last working day of the month of June. It is the applicant's responsibility to ensure that the grant application is sent to and received by the Executive Director by the required date. The Authority assumes no responsibility for delays or other problems with the transmittal of the application.
- 2. Applications will be considered at the July Board meeting following receipt of applications. Member governments applying for a grant will be expected to have a representative at the Board meeting to explain the request and answer questions.
- 3. Once a grant request is approved by the Board, the applicant's resolution, summary of the project and time schedule will be incorporated into a contract between the Authority and the local government. The contract (in three copies) will be sent to the local government for review, approval and signature by the local government and then sent back to the Executive Director for presentation to the Authority Board for final approval and signatures at the September or next appropriate Board meeting. Once signed an original signed copy of the contract will be sent to the local government.
- 4. Changes to the internal budget of the project, if applicable, may be approved by the Executive Director up to a 10% change in budget items. The Authority Board at a regular Board meeting must approve changes in excess of that amount. Requests for changes in the date of completion of the contract must be submitted in writing to the Executive Director for placement on the agenda at a regularly scheduled meeting of the Authority. Requests for an extension of the contract date must be done prior to the expiration of the contract.

HERNANDO COUNTY UTILITIES DEPARTMENT WATER CONSERVATION AND WATER RESOURCE PROTECTION PROGRAM

Overview

The Hernando County Utilities Department (HCUD) is one of the first local governments in the Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD) to establish a conservation water rate structure and since 2007 a "drought rate" structure. The drought rates are applied when the SWFWMD declares water shortages and customers use over 20,000 gallons of water a month. Average water use in the residential sector (single-family homes) is approximately 7800 a month. Hernando County Utilities Department supplies safe potable water and waste water services to nearly 85% of Hernando County. HCUD's customer accounts including, residential, commercial and industrial totals nearly 60,000 accounts. Hernando County was also one of the first local governments to implement a rain sensor rebate program for customers. We have continued these incentive-based water conservation programs including, low flow toilets, irrigation evaluation and audit programs, Florida Friendly certified landscapes, participation in Florida Yards and Neighborhoods programs. These programs, along with many others, show the deep commitment this utility has to the protection and conservation of Hernando County's water supply.

We survey and collected information from citizen's and other water conservation program participants to on types of programs that they believe is the most important. Using that information we put together a monthly series of water related programs. The Water Conservation Division of Hernando County Utilities Department held eight (8) educational seminars. The 2011/2012 programs collectively titled Hernando County Water Awareness Series 2012. This year's program covered a wide variety of water related presentations including, Minimum Flows and Levels (MFL), MFL for the Springs Coast, Micro-Irrigation workshop, Rain Barrel workshop, Understanding our Water Agencies, SWFWMD and WRWSA, Stormwater Management, Getting the Most from Your Irrigation System, Karst Geology and how it affects our Springs, Hurricanes and you! Speakers came from Tallahassee, Orlando, Sumter County and several from the area. 530 people attended these programs and each seminar was recorded and shown on Hernando County Government Broadcast channel 622. The series is being broadcast on our local government cable channel 622, which currently has a subscription rate of 33,000 and each program is shown once a week. Through the WRWSA Local Government Grant Program we support this division. The WRWSA provided support to this group and helped facilitate this important set of educational lectures.

Our most proactive and impact oriented program was with another volunteer group, Hernando County's Groundwater Guardian Team, which has been instrumental bringing the importance of the protection of Peck Sink to local officials and residents. As a requirement for this team to stay affiliated with the National Groundwater Guardian Foundation we have a series of Result Oriented Activities that are accomplished each

year. The organization if responsible for organizing and promoting a workshop every two years that targets local government leaders and community leaders on a variety of water related issues, best management practices and new regulations. The next workshop will be May 2012. These workshops were supported by the WRWSA, Southwest Florida Water Management District, Community Education Grant and private partners. Promotional and educational items have been and are being used to educate the residents of Hernando County.

The assistance of the WRWSA Local Government Water Supply Funding Assistance Program, all residents of Hernando County may benefit by the water conservation and water quality programs.

PURPOSE & PROPOSED INITIATIVES

Major elements of the program consist of:

- 1. Outreach groups (Citizens Programs/Water Awareness. and Springs Protections
- 2. County-wide user advisory committee (Groundwater Guardian Team);
- In-school education program (Hernando County Environmental Education Center, Gulf Coast Academy)
- 4. Conservation Messaging Campaign (partnership with SWFWMD);
- 5. Customer and Residents Incentive Programs including regional irrigation audit and education pilot project.

In order to better serve all of the citizens of Hernando County, those served by the county's utility system as well as those who use private wells or customers of the City of Brooksville, the county is applying to the WRWSA for funding assistance in the continued development and expansion of its water conservation and quality protection program. With this funding, the programs will include all water users of the county.

1. Outreach and Citizens Groups

Citizens for W.A.T.E.R. are a citizen awareness and education group that was first organized in the late 1990's. Water Awareness Through Education and Research (W.A.T.E.R.) is the component that initiated a series of public forums in 1997, with speakers from various agencies. The facilitators held classroom style presentations with audiovisual support and interaction with the audience. The presentations were videotaped for viewing on Channel 622, Hernando County's Government Channel, and are available for borrowing from the HCUD. The Spring Stewards will reach out into their communities and educate others about the importance and protection of our area springs. (Budget items: -educational materials, field trips, meeting costs, travel, postage, shirts and stipends for speakers.)

2. Groundwater Guardian Team

This group is authorized by the Hernando County Board of County Commissioners and is organized under the auspices of the National Groundwater Foundation. Members represent the major water users of Hernando County. The user groups represented are

power industry, agriculture, development, manufacturing, and recreational industries as well as representatives from the school system, city and county governments, and the Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD) and citizens. This group has developed, in accordance with the national foundation requirements, a "Result Oriented Plan" and implemented activities to communicate the importance of ground water protection in the community. The Team received its designation as a Groundwater Guardian Community in 2002 through 2012. The extraordinary efforts of this committee have received attention by the National Groundwater Foundation and the coordinator has been appointed to a national office. Additionally, the coordinator has been elected to the National Executive Groundwater Foundation Committee. And this year was voted by the National Team to be the Vice President of the organization. In order to retain its designation, the Team and the community must apply its plan and submit an annual report on the progress of implementation. The Hernando County Groundwater Guardians also bring groundwater protection issues to the Planning and Zoning Commission and Board of County Commissioners. (Budget items: educational materials, travel, field trips/seminars, award ceremonies, web site upkeep, postage, meeting costs and other materials necessary to complete their Result Oriented Activities.)

3. Springs Coast Environmental Education Center (SCEEC)

The SWFWMD purchased Weeki Wachee Springs and the attraction property to be part of the Weeki Wachee Preserve. The District has committed approximately \$750,000 to construct an environmental education center on the property, under the condition that the Hernando County School District supply teachers, curriculum and equipment. The Hernando County Water and Sewer District (HCW&SD) Board and the Hernando County Board of County Commissioners have pledged to support this endeavor and have authorized a contribution to the Education Center. The doors of the unique learning center opened in April 2005. Initially it will serve fourth grade students of Hernando County, with plans to increase participation to 8th grade students, and will be use for specialized workshops. This past year the (SCEEC) hosted over 6,000 Hernando County students. The Hernando County Utilities Department has specifically provided support for the development of a water resource/quality protection and water conservation module of the curriculum. By providing support to the center, the Utilities Department is allocating its resources to those skilled in working with students teachers. In addition, creation of the curriculum module ensures that a consistent and continuing message will be embedded in the educational process. In FY 2008 we added the Gulf Coast Academy of Science and Technology to our student educational efforts. GCA is committed to providing a unique education through weekly field experiences integrated with a hands-on advanced middle school curriculum. (Budget item: Springs Coast Environmental Education Center, Gulf Coast Academy)

4. Water Conservation media messaging campaign:

This campaign includes radio and televised educational programming through Hernando County Government Broadcast. SWFWMD has partnered with us in the past and they continue to assist by preparing radio spots and local media campaigns. The innovative and instructional media messages broadens public awareness and heightened the acceptance of water conservation was a way of life. As a partner in the campaign we have the opportunity to "tag" each message with our own contact information. Our "tag" has both the Hernando

County Utilities Department and Withlacoochee Regional Water Supply Authority. (Budget items: commercial airtime, radio and print media)

5. Water Conservation (Customer only) Incentive Programs:

Through innovative conservation programs, the Hernando County Utilities Department will encourage residents to conserve our valuable water supply. Incentive programs include participation in a regional irrigation audit and education pilot project. Partners will include, Withlacoochee Regional Water Supply Authority, Southwest Florida Water Management District, and other member government with the WRWSA. The Cooperative Funding Initiative (to the SWFWMD) is attached. Other water conservation customer incentive programs include a Rain Sensor Rebate Program (\$50.00), Low-Flow Toilet Replacement Program (\$100.00), and promotion of Florida Friendly Landscaping workshop, where customer attendees receive a "tuition" reimbursement on their water bill. Incentives also help further the promotion of Hernando County's Florida Yards and Neighborhoods (FYN) program. Customer rebates include a \$25 rebate for participating in the FYN rain barrel workshops and another \$25 rebate is available for certifying their landscape as a Florida Friendly Landscape. (Budget items: water conservation incentive program features, such as low flow toilets, rain sensors, irrigation audits, Et/soil moisture sensors)

CONCLUSION

The above elements of the Hernando County Utilities Department's Water Conservation/Water Resource Program are diverse and purposefully set up that way. An effective water conservation program for a public supply utility must reach all of its customers and must strive to change behavior and attitudes towards conservation of water in order to affect reliable, long-term results. This must be accomplished through a multifunctional approach including education, outreach, and financial incentives.

IMPLEMENTATION SCHEDULE

All of the above projects and initiatives will be ongoing throughout this fiscal year (2011/2012). Funds from the <u>current</u> (FY2012) WRWSA assistance program will be encumbered by the September 30, 2012. This meets the requirement in order to submit funding request for 2012/2013 fiscal year. The water conservation initiatives for 2013 will begin October 1, 2012 and conclude with all grant assistance funds being encumbered by September 30, 2013.

Program Description

Marion County Water Resources and Marion County Utilities work cooperatively to plan, manage, and provide educational services for a comprehensive, goal-based water conservation program for the Marion County Board of County Commissioners. The program aims to educate Marion County residents about efforts to protect and preserve the water resources of this area and provide opportunities to improve water use efficiency through indoor fixture retrofits and landscape improvements.

The program is conducted through public outreach, indirect public education, and water conservation incentives. The public outreach portion of the program includes participation in community events, exhibits in trade-shows, at schools, and with civic groups. It also includes water conservation workshops facilitated for civic groups, homeowner associations, libraries and other community groups. Indirect public outreach includes direct mailers; distribution of educational materials during workshops and events, and maintaining the visibility of the Water Resource Coordinator as a resource for conservation education. Additionally, conservation initiatives include a program offering free low flow devices and toilet rebates to Marion County Utilities customers which are anticipated to directly affect water use among citizens of Marion County.

The following is a breakdown of the costs of the various projects that Marion County requests grant funding for during the 2012-2013 FY:

Irrigation and Landscape Retrofit Program (continuation)	\$ 40,000
Regional Irrigation Evaluation (continuation)	\$ 25,000

These projects represent only a portion of the County's on-going Water Use Efficiency Program. 6b. Sinkhole Remediation

6.B. Sinkhole Remediation, Follow-up to June Board Discussion

At the June 20, 2012 Board meeting, Ms. Rose Rocco addressed the Board regarding sinkhole remediation in the area and the types of materials that are being injected into the ground to stabilize homes and other structures. In response to these and Board comments, the Chair requested staff investigate this issue and report back to the Board. The following summarizes staff's investigation.

No permit is needed to fill a new dry sinkhole and there is currently no agency with responsibility and authority for sinkhole inspections. Sinkholes occurring in wetland areas or sinkholes whose filling would alter surface water flows or contribute to water pollution may require an Environmental Resources Permit (ERP) before filling, issued by the appropriate water management district. Since many sinkholes are direct conduits to drinking water aquifers, some care in selection of fill material is advisable. The Florida Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), Florida Geological Survey (FGS), on its website: http://www.dep.state.fl.us/geology/geologictopics/sinkhole.htm, advises that a sinkhole should "not be filled with trash, chemicals, or other materials that could contaminate groundwater. Natural earth materials such as clean limestone rock, sand, and clayey sand are suitable."

FGS Director and State Geologist, Jonathan D. Arthur, Ph.D., P.G. reported that he is "unaware of any regulation focused on materials used to remediate sinkholes in this or any other state." Dr. Arthur does not believe that the type of material used to remediate sinkholes has been an issue. In Florida, the use of grout and bentonite (trade name for certain clays that expand significantly when in contact with water) are commonly used, or clean clay fill which may have a component of sand based upon the geological source of the fill material, according to the FGS. FGS Geologist David James suggested that someone from the FGS could discuss Best Management Practices (BMPs) for sinkhole remediation with the WRWSA Board of Directors at a future Board meeting. Additionally, Brian Balmberg of the Hernando County Engineers Office was coordinated with on this topic, and is not aware of anyone conducting a related investigation under the direction of the Hernando County BOCC.

Staff also spoke with representatives of the Southwest Florida Water Management District. District staff confirmed that there are no regulations or requirements for the materials used in the remediation of sinkholes. The District and DEP do regulate the materials used in the construction and abandonment of wells. These regulations incorporate by reference various standards promulgated by the American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM), American Petroleum Institute (API), American National Standards Institute (ANSI) and others. These standards are, in part, intended to protect water resources from possible contamination.

Finally, staff spoke with representatives of the Withlacoochee River Electric Cooperative (WREC). At the June Board meeting, it was mentioned that the WREC has had electric meters damaged by the expanding materials used in sinkhole remediation. The WREC staff confirmed one such case, where the expanding material traveled up the electric conduit and pushed the electric meter out of the meter box. This occurred in the Timber Pines subdivision in Hernando County. They were unaware of any other similar situations.

Staff Recommendation: This is an information item and no action is required.

6.c. Amendment to the General Services Contract with Water Resource Associates

Overview:

As you are aware, the WRWSA contracted with Water Resource Associates, Inc. (WRA) for General Services for fiscal year 2011-2012. This scope of work is for as-needed technical support services including general engineering, hydrogeologic and other services to support the WRWSA Board and Executive Director. Essentially WRA is on-call to provide technical assistance to the Authority in lieu of hiring permanent professional staff. This contract is on a time and materials basis with the consultant responding to either written or verbal requests for services from the Board or Executive Director. The contract not-to-exceed amount is \$25,000 for the fiscal year.

Although this contract amount was adequate in the prior fiscal year, the need to utilize WRA's services grew this year and it is anticipated that this need will continue throughout the remainder of the contract period (September 30, 2012). Some of the work requested of WRA from the Board and/or the Executive Director has and continues to include:

- 1. Charles A. Black Wellfield Rate Analysis;
- 2. Five-Year WRWSA Project Budgeting;
- 3. SWFWMD Cooperative Funding Initiative Application Process;
- 4. Assistance with the WRWSA Irrigation Audit Program;
- 5. Proposed Adena Springs Ranch CUP;
- 6. Chassahowitzka/Homosassa/Crystal River Proposed MFLs;
- 7. Assistance with Floral City Water Supply Issues;
- 8. Regional Framework Coordination with Members;
- 9. WMD Interagency Agreement Reviews and Coordination; and
- 10. Coordination and Assistance with New ED.

I am requesting additional funding to cover anticipated costs from June – September 2012. This is based on utilizing approximately 10-hours per month of WRA time and allowable expenses for an increase of \$6,400. The new not-to-exceed amount will be \$31,400. As you may recall the budget discussion at our June meeting, we are recommending that the General Services budget be increased to \$75,000 for fiscal year 2012-2013 but will include several consultants who will be able to handle a wider representation of the types of support and issues that the Authority

may confront and require assistance. This approach will enable the Board and the Executive Director to more effectively and efficiently target those activities.

There are sufficient funds available in the Reserve account for this contract amendment.

<u>Staff Recommendation:</u> The staff requests authorization from the Board to amend this year's General Services Contract with WRA by \$6,400 for a new not-to-exceed amount of \$31,400, and to transfer funds from Reserves for this purpose. All other provisions of the WRA contract remain unchanged.

Withlacoochee Regional Water Supply Authority 2012-13 Work Program

1. Transitioning Executive Director Responsibilities

A new Executive Director was selected at the May 2012 Board meeting of the Authority. The new Executive Director, Richard Owen, is a former Deputy Executive Director of the Southwest Florida Water Management District. Mr. Owen started his duties July 1, 2012 and will spend the following three months being briefed by the out-going Executive Director, Jack Sullivan on the administrative, legal and executive responsibilities of the Authority. During the 2012-13 FY Mr. Owen will assume full responsibility for leading the Authority.

2. Joint Funding of Water Supply Projects with Member Local Governments.

The Authority Board will continue its grant program to assist local governments in improving water conservation within the region in order to extend the use of groundwater as long as possible. Since the inception of the grants program in FY 1999-2000, the Authority has appropriated \$1,324,531 to local government projects in the region. During the 2012-13 FY, the proposed budget anticipates appropriating as additional ±\$130,000 toward local government water conservation projects. Proposals will be considered from any member local government in the Authority's jurisdiction. The grant program guidelines and application package may be found on the Authority's web page at www.wrwsa.org.

3. Tracking Water Resource Legislation During the 2013 Legislative Session that is of Interest to the Withlacoochee Region.

The Authority has contracted with Diane Salz, Legislative Consultant, to track legislation on water supply, water management districts and other water resource issues. The Authority has focused its attention on tracking any attempts to weaken or abolish the "Local Sources First" permitting requirements adopted by the 1997 Legislature. The Authority approved the continuation of its contract with the Legislative Consultant for additional work during the 2013 legislative session.

4. <u>Continue the Regional Residential Irrigation Audit Program to Promote Water</u> Conservation within the Region

This project is to provide an opportunity for residents within Citrus, Hernando, Marion, and Sumter counties (the Withlacoochee region), to obtain site-specific evaluations for optimizing the use of water through landscaping techniques and efficient irrigation systems, and to implement recommendations provided by a professionally certified contractor. Contractors used for the site-specific evaluations will be professionals certified by Florida Irrigation Society (FIS) or other recognized certifying agency in the targeted region. The initiative will include program information/education, reporting and analysis, code modification and program administration by a consultant. This project will target existing inefficient landscape and irrigation water use, and should result in increased water savings and water quality protection.

The Authority initiated this program in 2011 with joint funding through the Southwest Florida Water Management District's Cooperative Funding Initiative (CFI) program. The 2011 program will continue through 2012 and will be followed by another CFI program with the Authority beginning in 2012 and running through 2013.

5. Update of the 2010 Regional Water Supply Master Plan

A recommendation of the 2010 Regional Water Supply Master Plan is to update the Master Plan data and recommendations every five years. This would include updating information in the plan related to determining existing and future water demands, developing an updated water resources assessment and preparing an inventory and evaluation of traditional and alternative water supply sources. The Southwest Florida Water Management District was interested in the Authority moving forward with updating its Plan data during FY 2013 so they could then use the data in the update of the District Water Supply Plan in 2014. The District has indicated it will approve the Plan update through its Cooperative Funding Initiative program.

6. Finalize the Charles A. Black Water Supply Facility Rate Analysis

During the 2011-12 FY, the Board authorized a study of the current contract with Citrus County for water supply from the Charles A. Black Water Supply Facility (CABWSF). The Authority put this facility into service in 1992. The Authority contracted with Citrus County to operate and maintain the facility. The current contract provides for an allocation of 2 MGD for Citrus County from the facility. However, for a number of years, the County has been utilizing significantly more water supply from the wellfield. The Authority engaged Purvis Gray & Company, CPAs to prepare a rate analysis and recommend changes to the current contract between the Authority and Citrus County. This study is ongoing and projected to be completed in the 2012-13 FY.

7. <u>Continuation of Cooperation with Citrus County in Operation of the Authority's Charles A.</u> Black Wellfield and Water Supply Facility (CABWSF).

The CAB Water Supply Facility is currently operating and supplying water to the Citrus system. The Authority will continue to cooperate with Citrus County in the maintenance and permitting for the wells and the treatment facility per our operation and maintenance contract with Citrus County.

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Growth and sprawl on the march

Gov. Rick Scott's vision of Florida's economic future looks a lot like its past: heavily dependent on grand-scale development that creates sprawl and environmental damage but comes with no money to pay for the consequences. The Department of Transportation's revival of a six-year-old "Future Corridors" plan for major roads crossing interior Florida — along with the hiring of two prominent development executives to help make it happen — will tax water supplies, alter the character of rural Florida, and strip resources from urban transit needs.

DOT is spending \$106,000 to have two consultants interview owners of large tracts of land about their development plans and how they might dovetail with Future Corridors, the plan championed under Gov. Jeb Bush but shelved by his successor, Gov. Charlie Crist. The consultants are Billy Buzzett, the last secretary of the Department of Community Affairs, who helped Scott and the Legislature disband the agency and undo decades of growth management laws; and Chris Corr, an executive vice president for development support company AECOM. Both are former executives with the St. Joe Co., the largest private landowner in the Panhandle, where the company has scaled back its plans for development because of the real estate collapse.

Buzzett and Corr are assigned this task under the DOT contract: Conduct up to 20 interviews with major landowners to determine their development plans and what, if any, changes are needed in state laws or regulations that would lead to agreements between the state and landowners in preparation for building the new roads.

Never mind that DOT should have plenty of resources to accomplish this goal without hiring a pair of political insiders. Never mind that DOT already says the only way it can expand highways or build bridges is to slap tolls on them. The message is clear. DOT may have signed the contract, but Buzzett and Corr are really working Scott's jobs agenda. One "Future Corridors" route, between Naples and Orlando, for example, has been pitched as being able to sustain 10 more towns. And while such growth will add construction jobs in the short term, it is being pursued with even less consideration than in the past as to the environmental and quality-of-life consequences for those communities and the entire state.

This isn't wholly a surprise. As Scott's DCA secretary, Buzzett helped pass legislation in 2011 gutting what remained of Florida's growth management laws, including changing water and transportation concurrency law to make it easier and less expensive for rural landowners to develop their land.

Now it's mostly up to local communities and their elected officials to apply any modicum of restraint on developers' ambitions — the same improbable scenario that sparked the approval of the state's growth management laws in 1985. Scott no longer wanted the state to have that authority, even though it certainly didn't squelch astronomical growth during its 26 years of existence. Yet the governor isn't above deploying well-financed Tallahassee insiders into those same communities with a mission biased toward unbridled growth. Just whose interests is the governor representing?

Water democracy: Even as supply threatens to run out, public shows little interest

ST. CLOUD — The keepers of Central Florida's water supply, mostly technocrats and utility bosses, have labored for more than a year to identify and divide among themselves the region's last precious drops.

Last week, they put their work on public display during an open house that, according to a sign-in sheet, was attended by several dozen people representing various businesses, government agencies and environmental-advocacy groups. Only about a half dozen of those present were simply interested members of the general public.

Such is democracy when it comes to water in Florida, even as the supply threatens to run dry.

Various public-affairs experts and advocates say they worry that people's participation in local or statewide water-policy debates is often muted by complex science, specialized regulations and lack of involvement by elected officials.

"Water will never catch the public eye until it stops running out of the faucet," said <u>Bill Segal</u>, a former Orange County commissioner and a former St. Johns River Water Management District board member.

Some water watchers think a tipping point might have been reached a little more than a week ago, however, when nearly 1,750 people turned out for a rally at Silver River State Park in Marion County.

The event had been organized in response to a ranch owner's quest to pump 13 million gallons of water a day from the state's heavily stressed Floridan Aquifer. Most of that water — as much as the nearby city of Ocala uses each day

 would irrigate pastures for high-intensity cattle production at Adena Springs Banch.

The unusually strong backlash to the ranch's water-permit request stems largely from fears that it would reduce and pollute the water flowing from the area's already-ailing Silver Springs, a well-known and popular natural attraction and tourist destination since the 1800s. Backers of the cattle ranch deny that any harm would occur to the springs or the river they create.

Where a tipping point might lead is unclear in a state where the options for public involvement in water issues are limited or daunting.

A speaker at the June 23 rally — <u>Lee Constantine</u>, a former Republican state senator from <u>Altamonte Springs</u> who's now a candidate for <u>Seminole County</u> commissioner — said he encourages individuals and groups to join the Florida Conservation Coalition, one of the rally's organizers, as a way to have their voices heard.

Constantine, who as a state lawmaker was among only a few in the Legislature to concentrate on water issues, said turning to a local elected official to talk about water — as routinely happens when people have concerns about schools, taxes or crime — "isn't going to do any good. They can't look at the big picture of water."

In this part of the state, most of the people capable of seeing the big picture are part of the Central Florida Water Initiative.

CFWI members are drawn from the three state agencies, known as watermanagement districts, that control the region's water supply, and from the city and county utilities that must share the dwindling amount of water left to meet the demands of population growth.

The invitation-only group's inaugural open house Thursday was in St. Cloud, on the edge of the Orlando metropolitan area, overlooking the Osceola County city's scenic waterfront park on East Lake Tohopekaliga. Having done most of their work so far in obscurity, its members enthusiastically described tasks that, they admitted, involve cutting-edge science that often defies easy explanation.

They said they are attempting to: determine how much harm has already been caused to the region's wetlands and waterways by heavy pumping from the Floridan Aquifer; establish whether that harm is of an acceptable degree; and set a limit for how much more water, if any, can be pumped from the aquifer.

Deirdre Macnab, president of the League of Women Voters of Florida, said it's difficult for the average citizen to understand such a discussion, much less respond to it.

"This is one of our most precious resources, and we don't really know what's

happening below the surface," said Macnab, who didn't attend the open house. "We need an annual, reliable and understandable report on our water."

Robert Knight shares her frustration. Knight, a springs scientist in <u>Gainesville</u> and an opponent of the Adena Springs Ranch proposal, said the state's water-management districts seem intent on blunting public involvement.

"They are usually talking down to people. They give presentations that are frequently unintelligible. They go over things too fast and try to cover too much," Knight said of the districts' regular meetings. "I don't care to go to them myself."

Florida's five water-management districts are each run by a board whose members are appointed by the governor. The board responsible for east Central and North Florida, the St. Johns district, meets in Palatka, a two-hour drive from Orlando. Its staff has been honing regulations and permit procedures in relative isolation for almost four decades, mostly through times when water was still plentiful and drew little public attention.

"It's become very sophisticated — even an average lawyer wouldn't know the process," said Mary Jane Angelo, a water-law professor at the University of Florida and a former staff lawyer for the St. Johns district.

"It's also become very sophisticated scientifically," she said. "The water district has these Ph.D. scientists running these complicated models, and the permit applicants have their own experts with their own modeling and complex scientific information. So I think it is hard for the public to have meaningful input or access."

The district's procedures could also cut off public involvement in the Adena Springs Ranch application: Depending on how the agency schedules its staff recommendation and subsequent public hearing, any lawsuit filed to block the ranch's application could leave the fate of Adena Springs Ranch largely in the hands of a state judge instead.

Water quality war rages on

Lawsuit could come soon

The latest administrative ruling — that Florida environmental regulators acted properly when they enacted water quality standards less stringent than those of the federal government — isn't the end of the long battle over Florida water quality.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) soon will announce whether it accepts the Florida Department of Environmental Protection's (FDEP) water nutrient standards instead of its own tougher standards for regulating nitrogen and phosphorus.

If the EPA acquiesces, "we would challenge it in the federal courts. We're not just going to go away. The trend for our water bodies continue to be negative," said Florida Wildlife Federation President Manley Fuller.

"We're not just suing for the heck of it. We're going to use all the federal remedies at our disposal," Fuller said. "They (FDEP) won the last inning and now we're going into a new inning."

The "innings" in this game have been played since 1998, when the EPA ordered Florida and other states to come up with more stringent freshwater standards. Florida didn't comply, so Florida environmentalists sued the EPA to force it to develop its own water nutrient standards.

When EPA put forth such a set of rules, Florida lawmakers, utilities and businesses complained. Last year FDEP developed its own set of rules, less stringent than EPA's, and the Florida Legislature voted to approve them as the state's own guidelines.

In December, a group led by the Florida Wildlife Federation and the Sierra Club filed a petition with the state Division of Administrative Hearings (DOAH) challenging the new state rules. Florida Administrative Law Judge Bram Canter ruled that FDEP acted within its authority.

Many Florida utilities and Florida water bodies wouldn't have passed EPA's standards. As far as area waterways go, pollutant levels for the Silver and Rainbow springs are three times higher than EPA's proposed limits. Troy Springs in Branford also would fail to pass muster. Popular Lake Weir routinely fails to meet the EPA's proposed total nitrogen standard, with levels sometimes reaching double what the EPA would allow.

The county's rivers don't fare much better: The Ocklawaha, Withlacoochee and Rainbow consistently surpass EPA's proposed river standards.

Fuller said FDEP's proposed rules allow for too many exceptions that would result in the standards never being adequately enforced.

FDEP Secretary Herschel Vinyard said in a statement that the judge's ruling validates his agency's effort to develop effective water quality standards that take into account Florida's unique hydrology and diversity when it comes to its fresh water bodies.

"Our rules provide a clear process for identifying waters impaired by nutrients, preventing harmful discharges, and establishing necessary reductions," Vinyard said.

But Fuller said FDEP's rules won't work.

"The problem (of nutrient pollution) is not going to go away. Even if we lose in court," he said.

Please let me know if you have any questions regarding the summary (below) of current tracking activities listed in alphabetical/numerical order. Tracking activities provide an opportunity for exchanging ideas related to emerging legislative issues, policy direction, and funding for water resources and water supply. These activities create a venue for sharing the values of the Withlacoochee Regional Water Supply Authority when appropriate, and for building professional relationships with key executive agencies, water management districts, Legislators, and special interests. Working groups associated with these activities often begin vetting concepts, drafting legislation, forming coalitions, and finding sponsors during this interim period in preparation for the next legislative session. Water management district annual conferences which ended several years ago had in part served this important function. Tracking activities change as interest groups and statewide officials transition, particularly during 2012-2013, when redistricting has occurred and nearly every political office in the state is open for the August primary and November general elections. Staff will continue to monitor and report when appropriate on the following:

Agricultural Commissioner Adam Putnam's Water Policy Advisory Council: met on June 8, 2012, in Gainesville; next meeting not yet scheduled;

Central Florida Water Initiative: met on May 18, 2012, in Kissimmee; the next meeting is tentatively set for August 10, 2012, in Kissimmee;

Florida Conservation Coalition: recently held a rally on June 23, 2012, in Silver River State Park; the next event not yet announced or scheduled;

Key Executive Agency, Water Management District, and Legislative Policy and Staffing Changes: on-going monitoring and reporting;

Nature Coast Regional Water Authority: met on June 27, 2012, in City of Fanning Springs; next meeting is tentatively set for July 18, 2012;

North Florida Regional Water Supply Partnership: met on June 25, 2012, in Palatka; the next meeting is tentatively set for July 31 or August 8, 2012, in Palatka;

Numeric Nutrient Criteria Coalition: a conference call is scheduled for 10:30 am on each Monday;

Water management districts (SJRWMD & SWFWMD): attend or monitor televised meetings as needed;

Rep. Dana Young's Water Work Group: met on June 19, 2012, in Tampa; a follow-up meeting is not yet scheduled;

3rd Annual Florida Water Forum: scheduled for September 6, 2012 at the Renaissance SeaWorld Orlando; and

26th Annual Environmental Permitting Summer School: scheduled for July 17-20, 2012 at the Marco Island Marriott.
